## The Artists


#### **LEON BOTSTEIN** conductor



Leon Botstein is founder and music director of The Orchestra Now (TŌN), music director and principal conductor of the American Symphony Orchestra (ASO), artistic codirector of Bard Summer Scape and the Bard Music Festival, and conductor laureate and principal guest conductor of the Jerusalem Symphony Orchestra (JSO), where he served as music director from 2003 to 2011. He has been guest conductor with the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, Aspen Music Festival, Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra, Mariinsky Theatre, Russian National Orchestra in Moscow. Hessisches Staatstheater Wiesbaden, Taipei Symphony, Simón Bolivar Symphony Orchestra, and Sinfónica Juvenil de Caracas in Venezuela, among others. In 2018, he assumed artistic directorship of Campus Grafenegg and Grafenegg Academy in Austria.

Recordings include acclaimed recordings of Othmar Schoeck's Lebendig begraben with TŌN, Hindemith's The Long Christmas Dinner with the ASO, a Grammy-nominated recording of Popov's First Symphony with the London Symphony Orchestra, and other various recordings with TON, ASO, the London Philharmonic, NDR Orchestra Hamburg, and JSO, among others. He is editor of The Musical Quarterly and author of numerous articles and books, including *The* Compleat Brahms (Norton), Jefferson's Children (Doubleday), Judentum und Modernität (Bölau), and Von Beethoven zu Berg (Zsolnay). Honors include Harvard University's prestigious Centennial Award; the American Academy of Arts and Letters award; and Cross of Honor, First Class, from the government of Austria, for his contributions to music. Other distinctions include the Bruckner Society's Julio Kilenyi Medal of Honor for his interpretations of that composer's music, the Leonard Bernstein Award for the Elevation of Music in Society, and Carnegie Foundation's Academic Leadership Award. In 2011, he was inducted into the American Philosophical Society.

## BENJAMIN TRUNCALE VAP'26 tenor



Tenor Benjamin Truncale, from Long Island, New York, is a first-year student in the Graduate Vocal Arts Program at the Bard College Conservatory of Music, pursuing his master of music degree. He is thrilled to be performing Fauré's *Shylock* Suite with TŌN and Leon Botstein at The Metropolitan Museum of Art—part of their 2024–25 Sight and Sound series.

This season at the Fisher Center at Bard, Mr. Truncale was seen as a featured soloist in A Broadway Celebration with TŌN, conducted by James Bagwell, and in Come Out of the Cold: A Winter Cabaret with Anthony Roth Costanzo and his fellow VAP colleagues. In March, he performed a set of Benjamin Britten folksong arrangements in Bard's annual Kurtág Festival, and in February he sang the role of Lyonel from Flotow's Martha in a program of selected German opera scenes. In December, he was the tenor soloist in Handel's Messiah at the Episcopal Church of the Messiah in Rhinebeck, NY.

Mr. Truncale was selected to be a 2025 Vocal Fellow at Tanglewood Music Center, led by renowned soprano Dawn Upshaw, where this summer he will sing the role of Le Petit Vieillard in Ravel's *L'Enfant et les sortilèges*, as well as perform in other concerts and recitals.

Mr. Truncale holds a bachelor of music degree from The Juilliard School, where he sang II Dottore Sinisgalli in Nino Rota's *I due timidi* and Momo (cover) in Luigi Rossi's *Orfeo*. He also sang the role of Nemorino in selected scenes from Donizetti's *L'elisir d'amore* in a Juilliard scenes program in May 2024.

Mr. Truncale is also an avid and passionate recitalist. He performed an all-Respighi program in Juilliard's Liederabend CCXXI in April 2024, and in July 2024 he curated and performed his own recital featuring art song, folk song, and musical theatre repertoire in Italian, French, Welsh, and English, accompanied by fellow Juilliard alum harpist Amanda Beranek. Also in July, he participated in a concert series in the Berkshires, MA with Classic Lyric Arts, where he sang the roles of Ferrando, Tito, and Belmonte in selected scenes and arias from Mozart's Così fan tutte. La Clemenza di Tito, and Die Entführung aus dem Serail, respectively.

Mr. Truncale reprised his role as Ferrando this December in selected scenes for Classic Lyric Arts' annual gala at the Kosciuszko Foundation in Manhattan. He spent July 2022 and July 2023 working with tenor Francisco Araiza at the European Music Institute in Vienna, Austria, which both times included a concert held at the historic Schloss Laudon. He currently studies with Lorraine Nubar.



### THE ORCHESTRA NOW (TŌN)

Founded in 2015 by Bard College, TŌN is a graduate program that is training the next generation of music professionals to become creative ambassadors of classical music. Led by conductor and educator Leon Botstein, TŌN offers accomplished young musicians a full-tuition fellowship toward a master's degree in curatorial, critical, and performance studies or an advanced certificate in orchestra studies. TŌN's innovative curriculum combines rehearsal, performance, recording, and touring with seminars, masterclasses, professional development workshops, teaching, and more. The members of the orchestra are graduates of the world's leading conservatories, and hail from countries across North and South America, Europe, and Asia. Many have gone on to have careers in the Philadelphia, San Francisco, Boston, Vancouver, and National symphony orchestras; Orquesta Sinfónica Nacional de Colombia: the United States military bands: and many others.

TŌN performs dozens of concerts a year at venues including Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, The Metropolitan Museum of Art, and the Fisher Center at Bard. Specializing in both familiar and rarely heard repertoire, the orchestra has given numerous New York, U.S., and world premieres, and has performed the work of living composers, including Joan Tower, Jessie Montgomery, Jonny Greenwood,

and Tania León. In 2023, TŌN appeared with Bradley Cooper in the Academy Award-nominated film *Maestro*, and was featured on the Grammy-winning Deutsche Grammophon soundtrack, conducted by Yannick Nézet-Séguin. The orchestra has performed with many other distinguished guest conductors and soloists, including Leonard Slatkin, Gil Shaham, Neeme Järvi, Stephanie Blythe, Fabio Luisi, Vadim Repin, Joseph Young, Peter Serkin, Naomi Woo, Peter Moore, Tan Dun, and JoAnn Falletta.

TŌN has released several albums on the Hyperion, Sorel Classics, and AVIE labels. 2024 saw the release of both *The Lost Generation* and *Exodus*, featuring several world-premiere recordings. Other highlights include rare recordings of Othmar Schoeck's *Lebendig begraben* and Bristow's *Arcadian* Symphony, and the soundtrack to the motion picture *Forte*. Recordings of TŌN's live concerts from the Fisher Center can be heard regularly on Classical WMHT-FM and WWFM The Classical Network, and the orchestra has appeared over 100 times on *Performance Today*, broadcast nationwide.
